



#### Global Reach of the U.S. Military




#### The Top 15 Countries For Military Expenditure in 2016





## Chapter 2 – "Cold War"

- Era of US and USSR as opposing superpowers with proxy wars in other countries.
- US intervened directly 200 times in other countries.
- Korean case (1950-1953)
  - 4.5 million Koreans killed (75% civilians)
  - 54,000 US soldiers died
  - 40,000 US soldiers remain in South Korea, armistice but not end of war!
- Central America factor in refugees in US (e.g., many "Dreamers")
- Afghanistan
  - US supported mujahideen guerrillas against Soviets (1979-89), including Osama bin Laden

Did the US lose the wars in Korea and Vietnam, and is it losing the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq? What are the implications for the future of war and peace if wars cannot be won with such a superior high tech massive military?





## Chapter 3 – "New World Order"

- By 1989 the USSR and its allies were disintegrating
- US became friendlier with Iraq through Saddam Hussein
- US provided weaponry, including materials to make chemical and biological weapons (WMD), like anthrax which Saddam used to kill 100,000 Iranians (1980-88)
- Later Saddam used chemical weapons against Kurdish separatists (1991).
- Iraqi military invaded Kuwait and US responded, competition to control oil (1991).
- Did US policies of the "New World Order" create disorder instead?



## Chapter 4 – "War on Terrorism"

- Why 9/11 attack?
  - Osama bin Laden's rationalizations for Al Qaeda terrorism
    - Children dying from US economic sanctions on Iraq [UN est. 576,000]
    - Israeli occupation and oppression of Palestinians supported by US
    - Infidel US military in Saudi Arabia holiest land for Muslims
- US retaliates
  - Attack Afghanistan (2001 ) after Taliban refuse to turn over Osama bin Laden
  - "Shock and Awe" attack on Iraq (2003 ) under hypocritical and false pretense of WMD but motivated by control of oil
- [Gandhi "an eye for an eye will only make the whole world blind"]
- But what about terrorism in the US, and US state terrorism at home and abroad (e.g., blind support for Israeli war crimes against Palestinians)?




- "Revolving door" among personnel of government, military, and weapons industries
- First destroy a country, then profit from post-war reconstruction
- Massive response to 9/11 Homeland Security
- Need new weapons against terrorists [but unconventional asymmetrical warfare of terrorists including in urban areas like ISIS in Mosul, Iraq, 2017]
- What if peace were more profitable than war?



#### War Is a Racket (1935) Marine Major General Smedly D. Butler (1881-1940) most decorated American soldier of his time


Some excerpts:

- It is possibly the oldest, easily the most profitable, surely the most vicious. It is the only one
  international in scope. It is the only one in which the profits are reckoned in dollars and the losses in
  lives.
- A racket is best described, I believe, as something that is not what it seems to the majority of the
  people. Only a small "inside" group knows what it is about. It is conducted for the benefit of the very
  few, at the expense of the very many. Out of war a few people make huge fortunes.
- Who provides the profits? We all pay them -- in taxation.... But the soldier pays the biggest part of the bill.
- But there is a way to stop it. You can't end it by disarmament conferences. You can't eliminate it by
  peace parleys at Geneva. Well-meaning but impractical groups can't wipe it out by resolutions. It can
  be smashed effectively only by taking the profit out of war.... The only way to smash this racket is to
  conscript capital and industry and labor before the nations manhood can be conscripted.

### Chapter 6 – High Price of Militarism

- US spends \$776 billion/year feeding addiction to war
- Militarism contributes to higher taxes
- Reduces funds for infrastructure, services, health, education, etc.
- Threatens civil liberties
- Causes negative environmental impacts (toxic waste, etc.) <u>http://www.dmzhawaii.org/?p=5074</u>
- Recruits mostly poor seeking economic and educational opportunities
- War continues at home after soldiers discharged (e.g., PTSD)
- Invites retaliation from other countries and forces including terrorists, thus vicious cycle of revenge, perpetual war!
- When do the costs of war outweigh the benefits and generate social collapse?
- What happens when a society disintegrates?








## **Chapter 8 Resisting Militarism**


