Nonkilling Arts Research Committee (NKARC) Letter: May -June, 2017

Dear NKARC members and friends,

Since last NKARC letter, we had an international memorial gathering at MuRyangSa Buddhist Temple on March 11-12 in Honolulu to celebrate life of our beloved colleague late Professor Glenn D. Paige, and marking as per Buddhist tradition the 49th Day of his passing. The ceremony was attended by over 150 persons including family, NKARC members and friends: Mrs. Glenda Paige, Anoop Swarup, Chaiwat Sath-Anand, Tom Fee, Rich Panter, Lou Ann Ha'aheo Guanson, George Simson, Olivier Urbain, Jim Dator, Les Sponsel, Maya Sotero, Pam Omidyar and many more. It was beautiful to share our memories of how Glenn inspired us in our peace endeavours in so many different ways. Please see attached three images from the ceremony, especially a photo of grey stone plaque commemorating Glenn; the plaque contains his ashes.

This letter as usual has commentaries, contributions and news about Nonkilling related fiction, poetry, music, theatre, cinema, visual arts etc.

THEATRE AND NONKILLING

Two plays mentioned below fall into political docu drama genre: "The Great Society" by American playwright Robert Shenkman and "Truth and Treason" by Canadian playwright Rahul Varma. Preoccupation of the two playwrights is with the state of nation and its institutions that continue to hollow out its ideals of democracy through interplay of power, wealth, and militarism at home and abroad.

1. The Great Society by Robert Shenkkan is an epic play about America under the leadership of its 36th US President Lyndon B. Johnson, covering tumultuous period from 1964 to 1969. Shenkann's narrative is filled to the brim with real historical figures and is set during a not-too-distant exceedingly difficult period of American history that saw the expansion of the Vietnam War including assassinations of US President John Kennedy and that of his brother Robert Kennedy and the civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

A well crafted narrative about the politics of nation building, the play has 60 characters played by 25 actors in the Asolo Rep Theatre production that I saw in Sarasota, Florida. Director Nicole A. Watson remarks in her notes that America is a grand experiment which makes it complicated in ways that are both beautiful and heartbreaking: "we can either work towards meeting those ideals or we can double down saying one thing and doing something else. The tension is between having a singular character vs. multitudes of experiences that Americans have." The play has relevance to today's America.

2. Congrats to NKARC colleague and playwright Rahul Varma on the publication of his play, "Truth and Treason" in book form, it was published this month by Toronto's Mawenzi Publishing House. The play was premiered in Montreal in 2009. Varma's quest in this play is about unveiling the lies told by those holding power during the Iraq War perpetuating violence and the killing of an innocent child by an American soldier on the eve of a peace conference in Baghdad.

NONKILLING FICTION

Ernest Hemmingway's writings as a novelist, an essayist, and a short fiction author fitted well with his macho image and life of an adventurer, most of his writings were drawn from such experience. His two famous novels: A Farewell to Arms (1929) and For Whom the Bell Tolls (1939) were set in the First World War and the Spanish Civil War respectively in which he participated as a soldier and a reporter.

I recently came across an interesting new edition of A Farewell to Arms (2012) (New York: Scribner) with the author's notes as an appendix to the book. The novel set during the Italian campaign of World War I is a first-person account of American Frederic Henry, serving as a Lieutenant in the ambulance corps of the Italian Army. It juxtaposes the experience of war with the narrator's young wife's childbirth with tragic consequences.

The novel points to the need of human courage in love and life with Fredrick Henry reminiscing: "But with Catherine there was almost no difference in the night except that it was an even better time. If people bring so much courage to this world the world has to kill them to break them, so of course it kills them. The world breaks every one and afterward many are strong at the broken places. But those that will not break it kill. It kills the very good and the very gentle and the brave impartially. If you are none of these you can be sure it will kill you too but there will be no special hurry." (chapter 34, page 216). This astute observation about "killing" becomes a central thesis of his novel for which Hemmingway had to struggle in finding a satisfactory conclusion. As he points out: the struggle of an artist in search of "making up his absolute truth", demands dedicated scrutiny so that the final narrative based on the author's experience has to be truer than mere factual.

NONKILLING DOCUMENTARY FILMS:

(a) NKARC colleague Doc film maker Vishnu Vasu informs about the completion of his new doc film, "Handful of Leaves". It is a film about Sarvodaya movement founded by Dr. Ariyaratne in Sri Lanka . Sarvodaya is a civil society organization developed around a set of coherent philosophical tenets drawn from Buddhism and Gandhian thought. It has been operational for

almost 50 years. Today Sarvodaya is Sri Lanka's largest and most broadly embedded people's organization, with a network covering 15,000 villages, 345 divisional units, 34 district offices, 10 specialist Development Education Institutes; over 100,000 youth mobilized for peace building under Shantisena; the country's largest micro-credit organization with a cumulative loan portfolio of over LKR one billion (Sarvodaya Economic Enterprise Development Services, or SEEDS); a major welfare service organization serving over 1000 orphaned and destitute children, underage mothers, and elders (Sarvodaya Suwa Setha); and 4,335 pre-schools serving over 98,000 children; among others.

Rashida Khanam believes in presence of such nonkilling spirit in devotional and meditational music as well as in large part of classical music of both East and West. Rashida's reflection reminded me of late neurologist Oliver Sacks' book, Musicophilia - a book of thoughtful essays on music and the brain. Sacs was fascinated by the therapeutic power of music since seeing it in his patients both before and after being awakened by his L-dopa experiments as well as in his patients with conditions of amnesia, asphasia, depression and dementia being helped by the powers of music, and also how new forms of brain imaging and concepts helped in creating new 'Brain-Mind' constructs and categories.

LAST WORD

I conclude with my tribute at the Memorial Gathering for Professor Glenn D. Paige at MuRyangSa Buddhist Temple, Honolulu, Hawaii on 12 March, 2017. Text is given below.

"Good Morning, Dear Brothers and Sisters,

My name is Bill Bhaneja. I am one of the members of the Governing Council of the Centre for Global Nonkilling.

This morning we have gathered here to celebrate the life of Professor Glenn D. Paige who left us couple of weeks ago (January 22). It is a great honour and privilege to be standing here and say these few words.

This temple evokes many memories of Glenn Paige because this was the place where the seeds for establishing Center for Global Nonkilling were sown in 2007 when Glenn organized the first Nonkilling Global Peace Leadership Conference here and then again in 2015 when we had a Futures Meeting discussing CGNK priorities for next decade.

We will miss Glenn's thoughtful leadership, his optimism, his cheerfulness, and most of all his clear vision of a Global Nonkilling Society as he described it in his seminal work Nonkilling Global Political Science.

Glenn was a deeply spiritual person. His first letter inviting me to comment on his book, Nonkilling Global Political Science ended with the following salutation: "Om Aloha, Allah, Shalom, Salaam, Peace, and Shanti." That won me over to become his foot soldier of peace. I had never heard such a salutation from any other scholar which was so global and inclusive.

There was always a radiance on Glenn's face, a smile which reflected inner purity that comes from courage derived from selflessness.

Though spiritual, Prof. Paige was primarily a scientist. "Is Nonkilling Global Society possible?" Finding that question was Glenn's Eureka moment. Posing right question is the most important thing for a scientist. Once you have posed the question, the work starts, search for right answers begins.

All of us were awed by his Nonkilling creativity. For example, on Peace he would say that the way the term loosely used had caused more harm than good. He would say: Hitler also used to say that he was doing everything for Peace, Stalin also used to say the same, so did Bush. When I interjected that he meant we should be more specific, should we call it "Nonkilling Peace". Lifting his finger, he pointed out, "Hold on to that."

Similarly on 'Why Nonkilling?' this question was often asked in various fora. He would quote his PhD student, who later became a Professor in Thailand, Chaiwat Sath-Anand, reminding us that when a young student at one of the Nonkilling Leadership Academy workshops asked him "why nonkilling", Chaiwath replied: "Nonkilling is Alpha and Omega of our existence. Nonkilling is there from the beginning to end of life - our life, and life on the planet. Precondition to every activity is nonkilling - it is measurable". Without Nonkilling everything else becomes meaningless whether we are talking about environment, security, or amity. Reverence for life comes first, something that Glenn taught us.

Glenn loved precise formulations that could be examined, analyzed and tested.

For example for Peace, Nonviolence, and Nonkilling, he was adamant that these were non interchangeable terms. Though all of these were part of the same family, each had specific meaning. He had intellectual argument for Nonkilling's non interchangeability. See his following formulation:

"Nonkilling will certainly contribute to Nonviolence and Peace. But Peace and Nonviolence do not necessarily lead to Nonkilling." Then he will go on to explain, why?

Nonkilling creativity was very important to him. For his citation for Honorary Doctorate awarded to him by the Jagaran University in Bhopal, India last year, when the university wanted to put Political Scientist beside his name,he insisted that this be corrected to "Global" Political Scientist. It was not for status. But to make sure that social scientists have to rise above the confines of a nation state, citizenship and caste etc. To him a nation state and to be its citizen was too narrow and quaint - his vision transcended narrow definitions of race, religion and nationhood.

Just a week before his passing I was talking to Glenn on phone from Canada. He said three sentences which are very important, I consider these as his last words for me:

- * 100 years from now someone will recognize importance of a nonkilling world and society
- * I am sure all of you will carry on the nonkilling work you are doing, we have a big global supportive network
- * We are blessed to have Professor Anoop Swarup as the chair with his impressive background and wide ranging experience

It has been a great honour to be working with Professor Paige for all these years. May our beloved Glenn rest in peace! This memorial gathering inspires us to carry on his work, we have work to do.
